

"Swifties" (Taylor Swift fans) were once again transported to the enchanted realm of fairytales, teenage love and heartbreak, and wishes to never grow up, in her re-recording of her third album, *Speak Now*.

Taylor wrote all of the Speak Now tracks between 2008 – when she was on her 'Fearless' tour – and 2010. The album is an emotional rollercoaster of heart-wrenching ballads, pop-rock tracks to scream along to, uplifting songs and typical love songs that make your heart melt. In the re-recorded *Speak Now* (known as Taylor's version) an extra six songs were released which did not appear on the 2010 album, and are known as tracks "from the vault".

Although the majority of the lyrics stayed the same for Taylor's version, the re-recorded tracks had a different feel to them. Taylor's voice has matured and developed so much over the past 13 years, and so has her perspective on heartbreak. If you compare the original songs to the re-recorded ones and listen closely, Taylor is less resentful in her voice towards the men who broke her heart, and instead she sounds as though she has accepted those heartbreaks and moved on.

Her fans were shocked when they listened to *Better Than Revenge* (Taylor's Version) and heard that the lyrics had changed from "she's better known for the things that she does on the mattress" to "he was the moth to the flame, she was holding the matches". This lyric change may not seem like a big deal, but it represents Taylor's more mature outlook on not shaming women, even if they steal your boyfriend. The lyric change was a wise choice by Taylor, although some fans have taken their annoyance to TikTok by voicing that they will continue to listen to the 2010 version to hear the original lyrics.

Speak Now (Taylor's Version) was released on July 7th, just in time for "July 9th", which is a lyric in Last Kiss. The gut-wrenching song is one of my personal favourites. It describes the rawness and vulnerability after a first heartbreak. But you don't need to be heartbroken to feel the pain of this song. The lyrics that hit me the most are, "I'll watch your life in pictures like I used to watch you sleep. And I'll feel you forget me like I used to feel you breathe".

I was really surprised by the six "vault" tracks. They were not what I was expecting, especially her collaboration with Fall Out Boy in the pop-rock song *Electric Touch*. But my favourite vault track is *I Can See You*, one of her few "spicy" songs. It describes a secret attraction to a person in her daily life, possibly someone at school or a co-worker. Taylor impressed her fans by releasing *Foolish One* with very relatable lyrics about a "situationship" and crushing on someone who doesn't feel the same way about you.

ST KILDA – THE BEACHSIDE PLAYGROUND

As popular Luna Park is, there are many other stunning sights in St Kilda, such as the Palais Theatre. Built in 1927, the Palais is one of the best-known theatres in Victoria as it has a rich history. There is more to look at in St Kilda other than just the parks and theatres – there are also the lovely coastal areas of St Kilda. On hot summer days, you'll find lots of ice cream stalls near the beach as there are lots of sweaty people that just need a nice cold ice cream to really cool themselves down.

St Kilda is very well known for its famous theme park, Luna Park. Since opening on December 13, 1912, it has become one of the best theme parks in Victoria (and the oldest), along with being a much-loved destination for Victorians and visitors. The park was founded and developed by American entrepreuner JD Williams, along with the Phillips brothers. Due to WW1, Luna Park was closed for almost 10 years straight! It reopened in 1923 with new and improved attractions for everyone.





I believe St Kilda is one of the prettiest Victorian coastal/urban areas i've been to. My personal experiences with Luna Park, the Palais Theatre and other lovely places in St Kilda have never been negative – they are always very positive, because St Kilda is just a very nice and positive place. On the topic of Luna Park, my favourite rides would have to be the Scenic Railway and the Enterprise. Here's a fun fact: the Scenic Railway is the oldest attraction at the park at more than 100 years old.



Samosa

Ingredients

Dough:

100 gm Flour

Salt

20 gm Butter or ghee

60-65 ml Water

Filling:

30 gm Onion, diced 2 gm Ginger, grated 1 clove Garlic, crushed 15 gm Clarified butter 100 gm Minced lamb

> Turmeric, ground Cumin seeds, ground Coriander, ground

Garam masala

60 gm Potato, diced and cooked

30 gm Peas, blanched



My attempt.

Method

- Make dough by rubbing flour butter and salt together until there are no visible lumps of butter.
- Add the water and quickly combine to a smooth dough. Cover and refrigerate for at least 30 minutes.
- For the filling sweat onions, garlic and ginger, add spices and briefly sweat to develop a nice flavour.
- Add the minced lamb and 100 ml of water, cook for 10 minutes, add the potatoes and peas, heat through and adjust the seasoning if required. The filling should be of a dry consistency.
- Allow to cool.
- Roll the dough to a 3mm thickness and cut to the desired shape/size. Fill and seal the edges. Cook in the deep fryer and drain on absorbent paper before serving.

Gucumber Raita

Ingredients

1/5 Cucumber, grated
½ Tsp Ground cumin
125 mls Greek yoghurt
1/4 Garlic clove, pasted

1 Tbsp Fresh coriander, choppedPinch Cayenne or paprika to garnish

Method

- Squeeze excess moisture from grated cucumber.
- Combine all ingredients, serve with samosa, sprinkle raita with cayenne/paprika.

MY PERSONAL TIP:

This recipe is one of my favourites – not just to cook but to eat as well.

However, the recipe is timeconsuming, and if you are deciding
whether to try this recipe then I
suggest setting aside enough time.

Although the dough and filling
separately are not too difficult to cook,
I found the shaping of the samosa
was the most difficult part. I
recommend using a little water on
the edges of the dough so it sticks
together well and becomes easier to
fill. Furthermore, the samosas are well
matched with the cucumber raita.

BOOK REVIEW


A PROFOUND EXPLORATION OF LOVE AND RESILIENCE




