

David will play for the CAS side (which represents Victoria, South Australia, Western Australia and the Northern Territory) against some tough competition in Combined High Schools NSW, Combined Catholic Colleges NSW, QLD Maroons, QLD Whites and the ACT.

Our school will have a small spotlight put on it as each time the team is announced or David scores, our school will be announced and our logo displayed on the screen in the stadium.

Thanks to River Richards' kicking abilities last year, our logo got heaps of air time. You definitely know you have made it when you see your school logo up on the screen at the biggest rugby league event in the country.

The Fault in our stars



The main character, Hazel Grace, creates an atmosphere of what it is like to have cancer, and so does Gus Waters, who describes cancer as another thing that life threw at him.

Gus has a prosthetic leg while Hazel has a canister she has to 'haul around everywhere'. This was an amazing read and I would definitely recommend it.


